JR creates huge posters from their photographs and they paste these images on buildings, silos, trains and shipping containers as public art celebrating the life of the people they meet on their travels. Come and meet Peter Lacey, President of the South Coast History Society who simply wishes to share the fascinating history of the NSW South Coast.

His most recent efforts have been working on a joint project with the Bega Valley Historical Society to assemble an updated history of the Bega township which is partly revealed on his **Carp Street** walking tour.

One of Peter's historical snippets:

"There were once nine pubs in Bega. Four were closed down just before World War I, following a vote by the town's residents. One was the Occidental Hotel (where the Grand Hotel is today) and it became a Temperance Hotel serving tea, coffee, meals and providing accommodation - but it became a pub with no beer!"



The Temperance Hotel


ONE-OFF – Readings from 'On the Wing' poetry collection.


